Corner Drug, Home Improvements Group, Local Inspirations, Simas Family Vineyard.

Corner Drug – A Timeless History of Service to the Community by Kathy Harryman

Located at 602 Main Street, this building was built in 1890 by Joseph and George Jacobs. They ran it as a dry goods store until 1897 when Wallace Pond bought the store and opened a pharmacy. In 1934, Jess Vickery bought the store and named it "Corner Drug." In 1959, he became partners with Howard Gregg and Karl Hanke. Karl had begun working at the store in 1940 as a delivery boy. After attending pharmacy school, Karl returned to Woodland. He married, had one child, Lisa Shelley, who bought the business from her parents in 1999. Her daughter Sara, who is also a pharmacist, now runs the business.



This building originally housed doctors' offices in the back – Dr. Nichols, Dr. Morrison, and Dr. Fred Fairchild, one of the founders of the Woodland Clinic. They were there until a fire started in 1948. The doctors then moved to a building currently housing Nichols-Copeland Office building at 500 First Street (looks like a French cottage).

The pharmacy then took over the entire building.

This store was the first Walgreens agency in the state of California in 1934. The oak fixtures in the building were built by Walgreens. That is why when you enter any old pharmacies in other towns, you see this type of décor. Walgreens built the original store sign. In 1979, Walgreens decided to stop 'agency' stores and build their own buildings. Hence, Walgreens is now in Woodland.

This pharmacy sold a lot of liquor. It had its liquor license until 1979. It was also one of the biggest stores in Northern California to sell cameras. Remember when drug stores sold lots more than drugs!

There is some controversy about the origin of the neon tube sign in the front of the building. This is the second neon sign. When Karl bought the building, one of his expenses was to lease the sign. He bought out the contract which had been in effect from 1948-1980 for \$500. He was not one to waste money.

Outside the building

The building was originally built in the elaborate Victorian Italianate style. But in 1910, it was remodeled and became one of Woodland’s first Mission Revival buildings including the use of stucco, bracketed rille hoods above the corner windows, curved roofs, and the quatrefoil for design.

On the east side of the building, you can still see the remnants of a stairwell that lead to a bar that was quite popular before prohibition. Prohibition closed the basement bar.

The alley in the back of the building was not there. There was a building that was directly on the south side. When doing some plumbing repairs, a foundation was found under the asphalt.

Inside the building

The family has collected their own artifacts from the early years of the store. There is a public scale that was used outside of the building. Go ahead and weigh yourself in public! I dare you!!

There is also the original typewriter that was used to type prescriptions.

Check out the prescriptions and the bottles on the wall. Since pharmacists were chemists, there is a shelf with the herbal medicines. Be sure to check out the Byrns Hotel Registers with the written prescriptions glued over the top of the names. Nothing went to waste in this store.

Congratulations to the Hanke/Shelly family for all their years in business serving the patrons of Woodland and the surrounding area. Here’s to another 100 years.

CAMP HASWELL

1999 Hwy 16, Rumsey, CA 95679

Located 2 miles north of the town of Rumsey along State Highway 16. This old Boy Scout Camp is ideally situated to enjoy Cache Creek, have a picnic, or just pull off the road for a rest in the summer.

Potable water is not available. A portable restroom is available in the summer. The park is heavily used by rafters as a take-out site. Overnight Camping is prohibited. Closed at sunset.



Along the creek side of Cache Creek stands a stone building that was built in the 1930's as one of many WPA projects in the country. This building is named *Camp Haswell* and has been known in the area as the *Boy Scout Cabin*.

The cabin is made of local creek stone and mortar and was funded by the Works Progress Administration and built by the local people.

Today, it is a popular picnic area and local swimming hole and is used to launch kayaks. The building has survived the flooding of the creek because it lacks closed windows and doors. When the creek floods the water just flows through the building.

A local group, including a contractor, will work on restoring the roof. If you are interested in contributing any money to this WPA project, send a check made out to the Yolo County Historical Society, PO Box 1447, Woodland, CA 95776, with Camp Haswell on the memo line.

Fair Museum Update

We are still glowing from all the great comments about the museum during the fair. We have calculated the monies received and paid out. We spent \$5425.73. We received \$3230 from Big Day of Giving. Obviously, we spent more than we received, so YCHS donated \$2195.73.



The monies were spent on glass for some of the cabinets, light strips, bulbs, whiteboard for the window frames, and wood to finish off the windows. We bought foam board, a sign, paid for printing, hanging strips, and other miscellaneous items.

Dino and I met with Bart Vanucchi, the Fair Director, regarding the meeting we had with historical groups on October 12. We asked that the building be opened one time per month on the second Saturday. The hours would be from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. The building would be staffed by the various organizations that are in the museum. For example, on January 14, the Yolo County Historical Society would staff it. In February, the Railroad Museum would staff it, and on March 11, another historical group would serve. The goal is to have the museum open to the residents of the county and have the staffing burden distributed across the organizations.

We decided that we would have our official open house on the weekend of the Craft Event, December 3-4. We will be open during the craft show. We might have a train set up in the museum! Such fun!!

Showcase Tables


