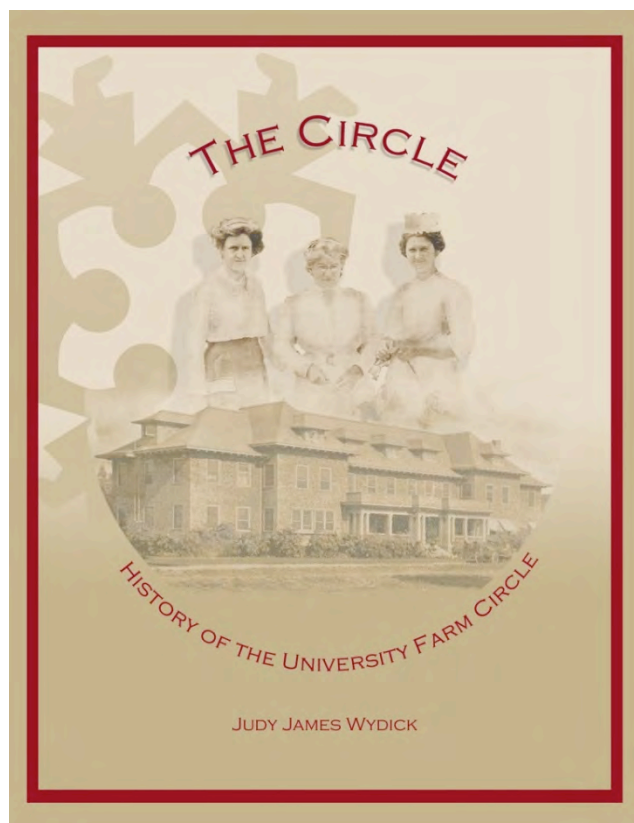

The Circle: The History of University Farm Circle is a book that covers 95 years of an organization supportive of the University of California, Davis. Why did the women choose to belong to Farm Circle? What kinds of problems did they encounter, and what contributions did they make? And how have they managed to keep the organization going for nearly a century?

University Farm Circle was formed in 1914, five years after the University Farm opened, bringing women together in this tiny, isolated community with its unpaved streets.

This book highlights what the campus and the town were like in the years until World War II—first for the faculty wives and other women connected to the school, and later for the very few female faculty and coeds.

Farm Circle's development parallels that of the school and the town, and the organization reflects what was happening around them—through two world wars, the Depression, the Women's Movement. UFC focused on helping students and newcomers, but as a women's group, it represents such organizations everywhere.

Past Presidents include Ruth Painter in 1950 (who is now 102), Lois Wolk 1982 and Ruth Asmundson 1984.

Hattie Sets Attendance Record

Saturday, March 3rd, was Pig Day at the Davis Farmers Market and also at the Hattie Weber Museum. An all-time one day record was set at the Museum when 161 visitors came to view the exhibits and portions of the pig collections of Senior Docent Roberta Stevenson and community member Kathryn Nilsson. Percy, the dancing/singing pig, led a drove of pigs of all sizes and many different materials. A 24" Piglet was astride the Museum's pony and a 2" 21st century pig in a bathing suit rested on an inner tube while consulting his laptop and talking on his cell phone. Great fun!

Our celebration of Jim Becket's 83rd birthday and his becoming Director Emeritus of the Museum on February 4th was also a very fun day. Jim's favorite musical group, the Putah Creek Crawdads, played for a crowd of about 60; Jim received proclamations of appreciation from the State Senate and the City of Davis and was lauded by multiple speakers. And we had snacks, cake and wine!

In early March we mounted two new exhibits. One displays photographs of public art in Davis taken by David Anderson. The second celebrates 100 years of California woman's suffrage with materials assembled by the Davis League of Woman Voters. The 1930s Davis exhibit continues.

On another front, the Davis Historical Resources Commission voted unanimously on February 27th to recommend to the Davis City Council that the 1937 WPA restroom building in Central Park be retained and used as an annex to the Hattie Weber Museum! The Council approved demolition of the building last November but the issue will be reviewed before any action is taken. Construction of new restrooms is slated for later this year.

On March 31, the Museum will celebrate twenty years of service to the Davis and Yolo County community. We will have a short ceremony honoring the City Council that approved the project and the architect who oversaw it at 2 pm on the 31st, followed by a reception. Refreshments will be served. All are invited. Please save the date.

The Hattie Weber Museum, located at 445 C Street, Davis, Ca. is open to the public on **Mon. & Wed.** from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Check out the website for The Greater Capay Valley Historical Society at greatercapayvalley.org. Editor-writer, Elizabeth Monroe, recently made and posted several short oral history videos: 2 of Capay Valley "old-timers" who recently passed away, Alfred Hayes and Gene Rominger; and 2 of William Petty, local historian, featured at Black History Day (last Saturday, Feb. 11), and talking about what it was like trying to buy property as an African-American in Woodland in the 1950s, and how he created a cultural awareness program for McClellan Air Force Base about the same time. Elizabeth conducted a historic walking tour of Esparto on Feb. 5 for the new owner of the Esparto Depot and her Bay Area art students, who are working on design plans to tie the renovated depot to the rebirth of the town. Elizabeth will be interviewing her soon to explore her plans and publish it in the upcoming March issue to accompany an article on the ClearLake-VacaValley Railroad through the Capay Valley, etc.
