## **“John Steinbeck and the Sacramento Conspiracy Trial of 1935”**

In 1934, a young, unknown writer named John Steinbeck met some labor organizers who were hiding from the law in the coastal resort of Seaside. The organizers were Communists, and they had just won a long, violent strike in the Central Valley to help raise farm workers' wages. The state of California was looking for the organizers to prosecute them under the state's criminal syndicalism law, which made it a crime to belong to a communist organization. Steinbeck immediately recognized the narrative potential of the organizers' story: there were heroes and villains, pragmatists and idealists, compromises and murders. He decided to write a novel about what he heard. The result, *In Dubious Battle*, was his first critical success. *In Dubious Battle* would also lay the foundation for Steinbeck's next novel about migrant farm workers in California, the monumental *Grapes of Wrath*, which would come to define the Great Depression for generations of Americans. Professor Kathy Olmstead's talk will examine all of the actors in this drama: the workers, the organizers, the growers, the vigilantes, the state prosecutors, and Steinbeck himself, and explain the role this story plays in Americans' understanding and memory of the Great Depression.

The **May 22<sup>nd</sup>** meeting of the Yolo County Historical Society will be held in the Blanchard Room, of the Davis Branch of the Yolo County Public Library, from 2 p.m. – 4 p.m. The library is located at 315 E. 14<sup>th</sup> Street in Davis.
